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MULTI-GRAFTED FRUIT TREES -- Please ask about our multiple-grafted Apple, Cherry, Pear, and European Plum.

~ ~ ~ ~ APPLES ~ ~ ~ ~

ARKANSAS BLACK SPUR APPLE – Large, late season. Dark red skin, high quality even where summer nights are warm. For dessert and cooking. Keeps many months. 800 hours. Partly self-fruitful.

FUJI APPLE – One of California's favorite apples. Sweet, very crisp and flavorful, excellent keeper. Dull reddish-orange skin, sometimes russeted. Mid-season harvest. Excellent pollinizer for other apple varieties. Less than 500 hours. Self-fruitful.

GALA APPLE– Wonderful dessert apple from New Zealand. Crisp, nice blend of sweetness and tartness, rich flavor. Skin reddish-orange over yellow. Early harvest, 2-3 weeks before Red Delicious. Good pollinizer for other varieties. Adapted to cold and warm-winter climates. Less than 500 hours. Self-fruitful.

GOLDEN (YELLOW) DELICIOUS APPLE – Long-time favorite for its sweetness and flavor. . Large, golden yellow fruit, crisp, firm and delicious. Fine apple for all purposes. Excellent pollinizer for most apples including Red Delicious. Reliable producer, adapted to many climates. Mid-season harvest. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

GRANNY SMITH APPLE – From New Zealand. Large, late, green, all-purpose. Crisp, tart, excellent keeper. Requires long summer. Thrives in hot climates. Prolonged bloom: good pollinizer for other apples. 600 hours. Self-fruitful.

GRAVENSTEIN APPLE – Famous for sauce and baking, also used fresh. Crisp, juicy, flavorful, tart. Early bloom, early harvest. 700 hours. Pollen-sterile, pollinizer required: Empire, Fuji, Gala, Red Delicious.

HONEYCRISP APPLE – A pleasingly crisp, juicy, sweet-tart fruit with an aromatic flavor. Good for cooking and eating out of hand. Skin is striped red over yellow. Stores well. Late season harvest. Self-fruitful.

NORTHERN SPY APPLE – Large, firm fruit is aromatic with a lively, tart flavor. Greenish-yellow skin with red blush or

stripes. Dessert/cooking, excellent keeper. Winter hardy, vigorous tree. Slow to begin bearing. Harvest about 10 days after Golden Delicious. 1000 hours. Pollinizer required: Golden Delicious.

PINK LADY (CRIPPS PINK) APPLE – New hot-climate apple from Western Australia. Very crisp, sweet-tart, distinct flavor. Skin reddish-pink over green when ripe. White flesh resists browning. Good keeper. Late season harvest. 4-500 hours. Self-fruitful.

PINK PEARL APPLE – Unusual pink-fleshed, highly aromatic fruit. Medium size, cream & pale green skin, sometimes blushed red. Tart to sweet-tart, depending on time of picking. Makes colorful, tasty applesauce. Early, profuse, showy deep pink blossoms in spring. Good keeper. Early fall harvest. 600 hours. Pollinizer required.

RED DELICIOUS (BISBEE SPUR) APPLE – Early fall fruit is sweet, crisp, fine-flavored. Vigorous, productive tree. Good pollinizer for almost all other apples. 700 hours. Self-fruitful, but bigger crops if pollinated by Fuji, Gala, Granny Smith, Golden Delicious.

RED FUJI APPLE (BC#2) -- Redder-skinned variety of Fuji. Medium-sized, white fruit is sweet, very crisp and flavorful. An excellent keeper. Will take Summer heat. Excellent pollinizer for other apple varieties. Mid-season harvest (early Fall). 350-450 hours. Self-fruitful.

SPITZENBURG (ESOPUS) APPLE – An old variety, regarded by some connoisseurs as the very best dessert apple. Red over yellow skin, yellowish flesh. Firm, juicy, moderately sweet, renowned flavor. Good keeper. 800 hours. Pollinizer required.

WINESAP (STAYMAN DOUBLE RED) APPLE – A long-time favorite late red apple. Juicy, smooth texture. Lively flavor. Use fresh or cooked. Late season. 800 hours. Pollinizer required: Red or Golden Delicious, Fuji, Gala, Liberty.

~ ~ ~ ~ APRICOTS ~ ~ ~ ~

CHINESE (MORMON) APRICOT – Cold hardy, frost hardy, sets heavy crops of small to medium size sweet fruit. Recommended for difficult, spring frost-prone climates. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

EARLI-AUTUMN APRICOT – Wonderful flavor as tested by Dave Wilson Nursery – both fresh and dried. Will please even the most critical of apricot lovers. Late harvest (mid summer). Self-fruitful.

**HARCOT APRICOT** – From Canada. Frost hardy late bloom. Resists brown rot and perennial canker. Medium to large fruit ripens early summer. Sweet, juicy, rich flavor – one of the best. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

~~~~ CHERRIES ~~~~

BING CHERRY – Large, firm, juicy, sweet, nearly black when ripe – superb flavor, the #1 cherry. Large vigorous tree. Mid-season. 700 hours. Pollenizer required: Black Tartarian, Van, Rainier, Stella.

BLACK TARTARIAN CHERRY – Medium-sized, nearly black, sprightly flavor. Vigorous, productive tree. Early season. 700 hours. Pollenizer required: all popular sweet cherries.

LAPINS CHERRY – From Canada. Dark red sweet cherry. Large, firm, good flavor. Similar to Van in color, Stella in shape. Sometimes sold as the “self-fruitful Bing”. Mid-season. 800 hours. Self-fruitful.

MONTMORENCY SOUR CHERRY – Large, light red skin, yellow flesh. Perfect for cobblers, pies, etc. Extremely winter hardy. Very heavy bearing. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

RAINIER CHERRY – Large, yellow with red blush. Sweet and flavorful – superior to Royal Ann. Very cold hardy. Mid-season. 700 hours. Pollenizer required: Van, Lambert, Black Tartarian, Bing, or any self-fruitful cherry.

ROYAL ANN (NAPOLEON) CHERRY -- Long-time favorite large, yellow sweet cherry for eating fresh, canning or preserves. Early June. 700-900 hours. Pollenizer required: Van, Black Tartarian, or any self-fruitful cherry (not Bing).

STELLA CHERRY – Large, nearly black, richly flavored sweet cherry similar to its parent, Lambert. Late harvest. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

VAN CHERRY -- Very cold hardy, reliable, heavy bearing. Fruit large with black, shiny skin, dark flesh with semi-sweet flavor, similar to Bing, though usually smaller. Resists cracking. Heavy bearing. Mid-season harvest (July). 700-900 hours. Pollinizer required: all popular sweet cherries.

**ISCHIA GREEN FIG** – A medium-sized, grass green fig with dark strawberry flesh. Oblate to spherical shape with small, fairly well closed eye. Excellent quality, fresh or dried. Green-colored ripe fruit hidden from birds.. Late season.

~~~~ NECTARINES ~~~~

HARKO NECTARINE – Medium-sized, sweet, firm yellow semi-freestone. One of the highest scoring nectarines in taste tests. Late-blooming, cold-hardy Canadian variety has showy, large single pink blossoms. Disease resistant. Reliable, vigorous. Mid-season harvest. 800 hours. Self-fruitful.

~~~~~ PEACHES ~~~~~

**CANADIAN HARMONY PEACH** – Late-blooming, vigorous tree. Cold hardiness comparable to Redhaven. Medium to large, firm, yellow freestone with red near the pit. Skin almost entirely blushed red. Used fresh and for freezing. From Ontario, Canada. Introduced in 1968. Mid-season. 1,000 hours. Self-fruitful.

**FAY (LATE) ELBERTA PEACH** – Popular yellow freestone; juicy, moderately sweet, flavorful. Fresh, can, freeze or dry. Blooms earlier and ripens later than Elberta. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

**FROST PEACH** – Resistant to peach leaf curl. Delicious yellow freestone. Slight red blush over greenish yellow to yellow skin. Heavy bearing, excellent for canning or eating fresh. Showy pink bloom in spring. Mid-season. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

**GARDEN GOLD MINIATURE PEACH** – This delicious yellow freestone is more vigorous than other miniatures. The later bloom is less susceptible to frost damage. Blossoms are very showy. Late-season. 600 hours. Self-fruitful.

**POLLY WHITE PEACH** – One of the most winter-hardy peach varieties, hardy to –20F. Reliable crops of tasty, sweet, medium-sized, white-fleshed fruit. Skin is crimson-blushed white. 1,000 hours. Self-fruitful.

**REDHAVEN PEACH** – World’s most widely planted peach! High quality yellow freestone. Frost hardy. Use fresh or freeze. Early mid-season. 800 hours. Self-fruitful.

**RELIANCE PEACH** -- Late blooming. Very cold & frost hardy. Medium-sized, sweet, flavorful yellow freestone with dull red blush over yellow skin -- best choice for climates having severe cold in winter and spring. Productive. Showy bloom. Mid-season. 900-1000 hours. Self-fruitful.

~~~~~ PEARS ~~~~~

BARTLETT PEAR – World’s most popular pear! High quality, tolerates hot summers. Early mid-season. 800 hours. Self-fruitful.

BOSC PEAR – Long & narrow shaped fruit with brown skin. Superb quality, one of the best. Great fresh or cooked. Late-season harvest. Pollenizer required: Bartlett or other.

COMICE PEAR -- The gift pack pear. Sweet, aromatic, fine texture, superb flavor and quality -- one of the best. Short neck, greenish-yellow skin with red blush. Late harvest. 600 hours. Self-fruitful.

D’ANJOU PEAR – Large, short-necked, firm, good quality, keeps well. Late season (one month after Bartlett). 800 hours. Pollenizer required: Bartlett.

SECKEL PEAR – The connoisseurs’ favorite! Sweet, flavorful, aromatic, & spicy – perhaps the best pear. Russeted brown skin. Resists fireblight. 5-800 hours. Self-fruitful.

**SENSATION RED BARTLETT PEAR** – High quality Bartlett-type fruit with attractive red skin. Relatively small tree. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

~~~~ ASIAN PEARS ~~~~

HOSUI ASIAN PEAR – Consistently rated the best-tasting Asian pear. Large, juicy, sweet, flavorful, refreshing, crisp like an apple. Brownish-orange russeted skin. Summer harvest. 450 hours. Pollenizer required: Shinko, Chojuro, Bartlett or 20th Century.

TWENTIETH CENTURY (NIJISSEIKI, "APPLE PEAR") ASIAN PEAR -- Juicy, sweet, mild-flavored fruit is crisp like apple. Good for fresh eating and canning. Keeps well. Easy to grow, heavy bearing small tree. Summer harvest. 450 hours. Self-fruitful.

~~~~ JAPANESE PLUMS ~~~~

**ELEPHANT HEART PLUM** – A home orchard favorite! Large, heart-shaped fruit with sweet, juicy, richly flavored, firm red flesh. Dark reddish-purple mottled skin. Hardy and heavy bearing. Long, late-season harvest. 500 hours. Pollinizer required: Beauty, Santa Rosa.

**LATE SANTA ROSA PLUM** – Medium to large reddish-purple skin, red-streaked amber flesh. Tart-sweet with rich flavor when fully ripe. Harvest about one month after Santa Rosa. 500 hours. Self-fruitful.

**SANTA ROSA PLUM** – Most popular plum in California and Arizona! Juicy, tangy, flavorful. Reddish-purple skin, amber flesh tinged red. Early summer. 300 hours. Self-fruitful.

**SATSUMA PLUM** -- Long-time favorite plum in California. Red/maroon skin, dark red meaty flesh. Sweet, mild, not tart. Excellent for jams and jellies. Harvest early mid-season (late July, August). 300 hours. Pollenizer required: Santa Rosa, Beauty or Wickson.

~~~~ EUROPEAN PLUMS / PRUNES ~~~~

GREEN GAGE PLUM – This European plum is later blooming than Santa Rosa and other Japanese types. Long-time favorite for dessert, cooking, canning. Relatively small tree. Tender, juicy, rich flavor. Mid-season harvest. 500 hours. Self-fruitful.

ITALIAN PRUNE – Large, purple-skin, freestone. Rich flavor, very sweet when fully ripe. Good fresh, dried and canned. Vigorous, cold hardy tree. Late bloom. Late summer harvest. 800 hours. Self-fruitful.

STANLEY PRUNE – Large, dark blue skin. Juicy, sweet, delicious, greenish-yellow meaty flesh. Freestone. Late blooming. Extremely cold hardy and reliable. Late summer harvest. 800 hours. Self-fruitful.

~~~~ PLUOTS & APRIUMS ~~~~

**DAPPLE DANDY PLUOT INTERSPECIFIC** – Taste test winner. Ranks with Flavor King and Flavor Supreme Pluots as best-flavored fruit at Dave Wilson Nursery tastings! Creamy white and red-fleshed freestone with wonderful plum-apricot flavor. Skin greenish-yellow with red spots, turning to a maroon and yellow dapple. Mid-summer. 500 hours. Pollenizer required: Flavor Supreme or Dapple Dandy pluots, and Santa Rosa or Burgundy plums.

**FLAVOR DELIGHT APRIUM INTERSPECIFIC** – Apricot-plum hybrid. Resembles an apricot but with a distinctive flavor and texture all its own. High taste-test scores – one of the most flavorful early season fruits. Early spring. 600 hours. Self-fruitful, but bigger crops if pollinated by any apricot.

**FLAVOR KING PLUOT INTERSPECIFIC** – Taste test winner. Unique plum-apricot hybrid with sensational bouquet and sweet, spicy flavor. Reddish-purple skin, crimson flesh. Naturally small tree. Mid-summer. 600 hours. Pollenizer required: Flavor Supreme, Santa Rosa, Late Santa Rosa.

**FLAVOR QUEEN PLUOT INTERSPECIFIC** – Exquisite new fruit, a plum-apricot hybrid. Candy-like sweetness, wonderfully pleasing flavor. Greenish-yellow skin, amber-orange flesh. Prolonged harvest, early to mid-summer. 600 hours. Pollenizer required: early blooming pluot or Japanese plum such as Burgundy.

**FLAVOR SUPREME PLUOT INTERSPECIFIC** – Taste test winner! Plum-apricot hybrid with sweet, richly flavored, firm red flesh. Greenish-maroon mottled skin. Early summer. 600 hours. Pollenizer required: Santa Rosa, Late Santa Rosa, or other pluot.

PINEAPPLE QUINCE – Large, roundish fruit with golden-yellow skin. Tender white flesh with a slight pineapple flavor. Good for eating and jellies. Ripens late summer.

~~~~ NUTS ~~~~

**CARPATHIAN (MESA) WALNUT** -- Good quality, thin-shelled nut. Very hardy strain of English Walnut, withstanding cold, as well as hot, dry climatic conditions. Late blooming. Ideal shade tree. Large, well-sealed nuts are resistant to sunburn. Plump, light-colored kernels of good flavor. Harvest early-mid fall. 700 hours. Self-fruitful.

# BARERoot BERRIES, GRAPES & VEGGIES

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## ~~~~~ BLACKBERRIES ~~~~~

**BLACK SATIN, THORNLESS** – Medium to large black berry has a honey-sweet flavor. A vigorous grower and heavy yielder, this is an excellent choice for home gardens. Thornless, these plants are semi-erect, rarely sucker and are disease-resistant. Ripens mid-summer.

**BOYSENBERRY** -- Very large, non-shiny, dark maroon berries. Soft, very juicy flesh. The Boysen has a distinctive, rich, tangy flavor and very aromatic. Excellent for eating fresh, juice, freezing, canning, pastries, and preserves. Ripens early summer, and are among the largest of the small fruits. Vigorous, trailing vines.

**BOYSENBERRY, THORNLESS** – Medium-size, reddish-black berry. Soft and very juicy with a sweet-tart flavor. Good for canning, freezing, and eating fresh. Popular thornless variety. Ripens early summer.

**MARIONBERRY** – Large, bright black, and excellent flavored berries. Recommended for fresh eating, jams, preserves, and desserts. Vigorous, thorny plant, strong canes and thrifty cane production. Ripens in July and early August along with the Boysenberry. Seeds are 1/7 the size of Boysen. Popular commercially and is possibly hardier than Boysen.

## ~~~~~ BLUEBERRIES ~~~~~

**BLUECROP** -- Medium to large, open clusters of large, firm, crack resistant, light blue fruit. High quality fruit with good sub-acid flavor. Good for fresh eating, preserves, baking and freezing. Vigorous, upright growth, will reach 4-6 feet at maturity. Slender light red canes. Tends to overbear unless properly pruned. Ripens midseason.

**JERSEY** – One of the oldest and most widely grown of all varieties, this is a favorite for home gardeners wanting an easy to grow, heavy producing late season variety. This bush grows quite large, often reaching 7 feet at maturity. The dark blue, small to medium sized fruit is very sweet and a favorite for baking. A reliable producer year after year.

**REKA** – Reka was selected and developed in New Zealand. It is vigorous, fast growing and adapts well to a wide range of northern climates and soil types. Gardeners will marvel at its bountiful yields of early ripening, medium sized, tasty berries. Burgundy red fall color is an added landscape bonus.

**HARDYBLUE** -- Hardyblue is an old established variety in the Pacific Northwest known for heavy crops of superior flavored, sweet berries. The dark blue fruit is perfect for muffins and pancakes. Hardyblue has a reputation for being adaptable to many soil types, including heavier clay soils. The dark red wood is striking in a winter landscape.

## ~~~~~ GOOSEBERRIES ~~~~~

**OREGON CHAMPION**– Medium to large, light green to yellow fruit. These vigorous 3-5 ft. plants with moderately dense foliage prefer a cooler, more humid area of your garden with shade. Intolerant of saline soils. Good for pies and canning. Ripens early spring.

## ~~~~~ RASPBERRIES ~~~~~

**FALL GOLD (EVERBEARING)** – The very sweet berries of this yellow variety are large, juicy & firm. The plant's winter hardiness makes it a good choice for northern gardens. It is a vigorous grower. Ripens in late spring and July-August right up to hard frost.

**HERITAGE RED (EVERBEARING)** – Large, very firm, excellent quality berry. An ever-bearing variety with vigorous, hardy canes which do not need staking. The #1 fall variety nationwide. Moderate late spring crop and heavy production late summer.

**JEWEL BLACK** -- Vigorous, erect, hardy, and consistently productive. Large, black-skinned, glossy, good quality, firm fruit ripens in mid-season. Fruit forms a fairly tight cluster at the tip of lateral branches. Ripening is concentrated allowing most of the crop to be picked in two to three pickings.

## ~~~~~ GRAPES ~~~~~

**BLACK MONUKKA (SEEDLESS)** – Medium-sized, black grape. Tender skin with excellent, crisp, sweet flavor. One of the hardiest, it's good fresh or for raisins. Cane or spur pruning. Ripens late summer.

**EASTERN CONCORD SEEDLESS** – Small, blue-black seedless grape with thick skin. Excellent, strong flavor. Good table grape and highly regarded for pies! Cane or spur pruning. Ripens early fall.

**FLAME (SEEDLESS)** – Medium-sized, red grape with firm flesh and good eating quality. This seedless variety is very productive. Fruit color may be affected in extremely hot areas. Cane pruning. Ripens late summer.

**PERLETTE (SEEDLESS)** – Large, whitish-green with thin skin. Flesh is firm, crisp, juicy, seedless. Good fresh or for raisins. Cane pruning. Ripens mid-summer.

**THOMPSON SEEDLESS** – Medium-sized, greenish-white to golden, seedless grape for either table or wine. This is the world's leading raisin variety. Cane pruning. Ripens late summer.

## ~~~~~ VEGETABLES ~~~~~

**JERSEY KNIGHT ASPARAGUS** – Patented male hybrid (more vigorous than females). Large, attractive spears. High-yielding. Excellent fusarium (wilt disease) tolerance and rust resistance.

**CRIMSON CHERRY RHUBARB** – The reddest variety, tends to be red all the way through the stalk. The best commercial variety in the Pacific Northwest.

**VICTORIA RHUBARB** – Green stalks mark the major difference between this variety and the Cherry Rhubarb below. Harvest in spring.
